SCOM 1500: Public Speaking

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COURSE DESCRIPTION

SCOM (Speech Communication) 1500: Public Speaking is designed to teach students how to prepare and deliver speeches to inform and to persuade for both academic and professional settings.

- ✓ The preparation phase focuses on content (what your speech is about) and organization (arranging your ideas). Most students are comfortable with this part.
- ✓ It's the delivery part (actually giving the speech) that can be intimidating. Read more below about how we will approach this step by step to make it easier for you.

Plan: Focusing on the **3Cs** so that you become **Comfortable**, **Confident**, & **Competent** as a public speaker.

- **Content:** We'll use things that you are familiar and comfortable with, such as a favorite place or activity, for a short mini-presentation.
- **Delivery:** Instead of standing up in front of the class, you'll start by giving your mini-presentation in pairs & small groups for practice, and then later in front of the class.

Step 2

- **Content:** We'll move from easy content to moderate content, focusing on topics related to your university major or future career. This is something you're still familiar with, but more challenging than the ones above.
- **Delivery:** You'll again get to practice in a small group before speaking in front of the class, but this presentation will be slightly longer.

Step 3

- **Content:** While the above are informative speeches, in this section we'll focus on persuasive speaking, which is particularly important for your future career (whether you're in front of a group, sitting around a table, or speaking one on one with your supervisor).
- **Delivery:** By now, you will be comfortable, confident, and competent!

EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING

This course will incorporate experiential learning, which is the process of learning through experience, aka hands-on learning.

This takes place two ways:

- *Class outings*
- *Personal engagement*



These outings and engagement include places of local interest (cultural sites, museums), activities, or even basic things like observations in the local community.

Students will then use these experiences as ideas for presentations, in addition to the content noted above.
